


#### A Message to John:

## Field Trip to Washington, D.C.



### From Pennsylvania to Pennsylvania Avenue

Washington, DC – home to the White House, Washington Monument, Air and Space Museum, and lots of actuarial opportunities! This March, 18 Penn State actuarial students had the chance to take a two-day trip to visit actuarial firms in the DC area, learn more about the actuarial industry, and enjoy the sights of our nation's capital. Though the club usually schedules a spring corporate field trip, this year was particularly special, as attendees enjoyed a two-day excursion instead of the customary single-day trip. This allowed trip-goers to take more time to meet with employees and alumni, ask lots of questions in order to learn more about the companies, and grow closer as peers.

After leaving early in the morning of Friday, March 24<sup>th</sup>, the students' first stop was in Alexandria, Virginia, to meet with Willis Towers Watson. Throughout the morning, students learned about the functions of the company, the retirement industry as a whole, and then heard mini-presentations about life as a WLTW employee. Students also got to interact with the employees over lunch and during office tours, and were very excited with how many actuaries came out to engage with the visitors. Next, the students took the metro to Mercer, where they briefly discussed career planning and goals and then partook in a panel discussion with many prominent figures and PSU alums from the Mercer office. Everyone agreed that actual on-site visits to the companies gave them a level of understanding of the company environment that would be unattainable in any other format. Even further, students gained insight into the backgrounds and career paths of a variety of alumni. Freshman Gianna Wilkie commented, "It was really nice to hear each employee's story of how they got to where they were. They showed that there's not just one way to get to a certain point in your career. Sometimes it seems as though there's only one direction to take, but I found it very nice to know that there's versatility in choosing your own path." The companies, too, seemed to enjoy the visit, especially the Penn State

Actuarial Science Club water bottles they received as tokens of appreciation for taking the time to speak to the club!

Later Friday evening, Penn State actuarial alumni working at both Willis Towers Watson and Mercer, as well as Deloitte and PWC, met up with students for an alumni dinner. "It was helpful and interesting to hear from some distinguished alumni about what life has been like for them after graduation. It let me know what to expect and look forward to!" remarked sophomore Ethan Frederick. Exhausted from the busy day, everyone was ready to turn in for the evening. The club was fortunate enough to find an affordable Airbnb with ample bed space for all attendees, and the students really enjoyed some bonding time outside of regular classes and homework groups.

The next day, the students headed to the National Mall to enjoy the cherry blossoms at full bloom before trekking to a one-of-a-kind destination: The American Academy of Actuaries. Over lunch, two Academy members gave presentations on professional standards set by the academy, the diversity of the actuarial profession, and the involvement of the Academy in setting national actuarial policy. Though attendees often get to hear from companies and actuarial firms, it is rare to speak with people who understand and affect the roles of all actuaries nationwide, and students really seemed to enjoy this opportunity. After some final sightseeing, the students returned home safely, all having enjoyed a busy weekend and feeling like they had gained a much better understanding of different actuarial opportunities in the Washington DC area! Special thanks to Kylie Krout, Ivan Yen, Mitch Yerk, and John Zhang for driving everyone to and from DC and to all the companies and alumni who hosted us for the trip – it was certainly a great two days!





### Feedback on the Club's Mentoring Program

#### **Mentoring Program 101**

In the past, Ron (the crazy guy) singlehandedly ran the entire Actuarial Science Mentoring Program. This year, the Actuarial Science Club took on the task of setting up a student-run Actuarial Science Club Mentoring Program.

Students who enrolled in the program were paired with an upper classman with one or more exams passed and preferably an internship. International students got two mentors, an American mentor and an International mentor. Mentors and mentees applied via survey and were matched based on which college the Actuarial Science option is taken, double majors, and minors. Mentors provided advice through email, text, GroupMe, and in-person. Both mentee's and mentors were required to have a mock interview.

With lots of guidance from Ron, in spring of 2017, 100 freshmen and sophomores successfully joined the ActSci Mentor Program. Thirty amazing sophomore and juniors became their mentors. Below are a few words from some of these *incredible* individuals.

### Tips for the Career Fair

A crowded Business Building atrium, opportunities, excitement, and some nerves all come to mind when thinking about the career fair. There are so many opportunities to reach for, but there is a lot at stake. Over 40 students got internships at companies participating in the Actuarial Science Club Career Fair last year and several dozen got full-time offers from those same companies. The annual career fair is one of, if not the absolute best way to find an internship and a full-time job for someone studying Actuarial Science at Penn State. So the best way to be prepared to find the job of your dreams is to prepare as best you can for this event. So how should you do this?

#### 1. Build an Outstanding Résumé

Building an outstanding résumé is not something you can do the night before the career fair. This is something that you will have to work on constantly throughout your college career to make yourself an attractive candidate for companies. A couple basic important aspects that companies are looking for are exams passed and GPA. While there is no right number for either of these, they help to compare you to the rest of the people applying from Penn State. Because we all take most of the same classes and take the same Actuarial Exams, having a higher GPA or having one more exam passed than your peers can set you apart quickly. But GPA and exams are not everything! You must also show you are a leader. A quick perusal of some of the internship and full-time programs at several of the companies that come to the career fair will show you names like the "Actuarial Executive Development Program" or the "Actuarial

the career fair will show you names like the "Actuarial Executive Development Program" or the "Actuarial Leadership Development Program." It's no coincidence that these programs have these names, because they produce executives and leaders within their respective companies. Which is why to get into one of these programs you have to show that you have leadership capability. The best way to do this is through what you

are involved in on campus. Whether it's THON, Greek Life, the Actuarial Science Club, or any other organization, it is important not only to show your involvement, but also what you bring to the table in each of these organizations. Just being a general member doesn't show that you are a leader. Instead, choose a couple groups to get really involved with and hold a leadership role in each of those. Showing strong leadership ability will help you to round out your résumé and add to your GPA and exams passed.

#### 2. Research the Companies

Before the career fair you should do some research on some of the companies that are coming that you may be interested in. This can help you to come up with talking points for when you talk to the recruiter and allow you to understand things that are going on with the companies currently (mergers, acquisitions, new and changing regulations, etc.).

#### 3. Apply Early!

What many people don't know is that some companies will reach out before the career fair to some students to set up interviews. So, to be one of these lucky people make sure to get your résumé out there early and apply on Smeal Connect or NLCN to your top companies well before the career fair even arrives.

#### 4. Go to the Info Sessions

The Actuarial Science Club organizes many info sessions the day before and the day of the career fair. An easy way to get face time with the recruiters for some of your top companies before the career fair is to go to the info sessions. Make sure to pay attention, ask questions, and make sure they remember you! This will help with making a connection with the recruiters when it comes to the actual career fair.

#### 5. Look Presentable and Be Someone You Would Want to Hire

On the day of the career fair you are essentially presenting yourself to the recruiters. Make sure that you look presentable (business professional, etc.) and act friendly! These will be your colleagues if you are hired so they want to make sure you're someone they'll want to work with.

#### 6. Ace the Interview

This is easier said than done. Interviews can be hard at first, but with some practice you can become much better at it. You can schedule mock interviews at the Bank of America Building and at Career Services in the Business Building. You can also reach out to your mentor in the Club's mentor program for advice and preparation tips. Try your best and try not to look nervous.

I look forward to seeing how well you all do at this year's career fair!


Corporate Liaison Ivan Yen (E3)


Corporate Outreach Officer Paul Birch (E1)


Student Relations Liaison Yalan Yu (E13)
